This story is based on a Ukrainian folktale. Nikki's grandmother knits snow-white mittens that he takes on an adventure. Your child will enjoy the charm and humor in the portrayal of the animals as they make room for each new animal in the mitten and sprawl in the snow after the big sneeze. One of the principles for reading with your deaf child offered by the Le Clerc Centre's Shared Reading Project is, "**Keep both languages visible (ASL and English).**" As you enjoy the book with your child sit so that your child can see you and the book. This is a terrific book for getting comfortable with gesturing. Each animal's personality and/or attributes can be expressed in gestures that give life to the English language description in the story. Gesturing is a huge part of ASL. Have fun with the story as each new animal squeezes into the mitten.

Let's Play Together

Guess Who?

Watch the DVD closely for the ASL sign for each animal. You will find animal mask templates in your ASL RAPP pack and some string. Color and cut out the animal masks and put the string through the holes in each mask. Introduce the story animals by showing each mask and signing the name of the animal. Use gestures to act out all of the WHO questions. Gesture/sign the questions...your child can hold up an animal mask to show you the answer. Make up your own questions about the other animals in the story.

WHO has strong legs? (*Don't forget, in ASL the question word comes at the end of the sentence. Sign/gesture 'strong legs' and then sign 'who'?*)

WHO is full of energy?

WHO likes to hop and jump?

RABBIT, that's who!

WHO is very small?

WHO like to burrow underground?

WHO has long claws?


MOLE, that's who!

WHO has big eyes?

WHO says, "Whoo whoo"?

WHO has feathers?

OWL, that's who!

Let's Be Together

Reading can be a cozy bedtime or afternoon cuddle session with your child, an exciting, interactive experience or a fun and creative moment spent together. Let's Create

Leaf Prints

You will need:

- paint in assorted colors
- paint brushes
- paper and/or blank cards
- water
- scissors
- glue
- interesting things from nature (i.e. twigs, small pieces of moss, small pine cones, leaves etc.)
- string or yarn to decorate (optional)

Go on a nature walk in a forest, your backyard or a park to collect different shaped leaves, and small interesting items from nature.

Clean and paint the surface of a leaf. Press the painted leaf onto the paper surface being careful not to smudge the paint. Repeat using different shaped leaves, other interesting things you found on your walk and colors.

Create a pattern directly on the paper or cut out to create a collage. Decorate with whatever you have left.
